Mike and Kim Crilly met when they were in 9th grade attending Brookhaven Junior High (now The Christian Academy). While attending Sun Valley High School, they began earning money fixing cars after school out of their garage and eventually scraped together enough money to purchase and restore the run-down building at the corner of E. Elbon and Edgmont Avenue, which had previously been Malloy's Garage. They were 28 and 27 years old when they opened the doors on March 22, 1989.

As the years went on they expanded, building the bays and buying the building on the corner of E. Forrestview and Edgmont.

Some may remember it as Shull's Candy Store before it was JD Draperies. They also purchased the land across the street from the shop, planning to expand further, but instead sold it to the borough to be developed into the veteran's memorial park on Edgmont.

Crilly's has been in business for 33 years and Mike and Kim have watched Parksiders grow up as they attended the elementary school. Kim has been listed as the emergency contact for the school to call for many children over the years. Their daughter, Ashlyn, attended Parkside Elementary and has two sons of her own, ages 6 and 4.



Tim Shepard, their technician, pictured on the right, grew up on Elbon and has worked for the Crilly's for 18 years. They have maintained, inspected, and repaired cars for more than a generation of Parkside residents. You can't beat the convenience



MURDERVILLE

Will Arnett (Arrested Development) stars in Murderville, the American version of the British series, Murder in Successville. The show uses a combination of clever scripting and improvisation as a celebrity, who was not given a script, attempts to solve a murder mystery using the clues they gather as they play Will Arnett's new partner.

As Detective Terry Seattle, Arnett guides each new partner as they investigate the murder scene and gather clues from three suspects to determine who they believe committed the murder. Arnett is joined by a talented cast of regulars as they tell the narrative that overarches the six episodes in this series.

The guest stars who portray Seattle's partner are Conan O'Brien, Marshawn Lynch, Kumail Nanjiani, Annie Murphy, Sharon Stone, and Ken Jeong. For me, the standout star in this series is Marshawn Lynch, the former Seattle Seahawks running back who famously replied to every post-game interview question with, "I'm just here so I won't get fined," or something similar after being fined for refusing to speak to the media.

A Parkside Movie Review

The show contains some language that would not be allowed during prime-time network shows, but I found it appropriate for my teens and we watched it as a family, one episode each day. It is repetitive enough that it may not be good for bingeing. We laughed a lot and enjoyed discussing the clues we were given along the way to see who could correctly identify the murderer.

Having been a fan of the British show, "Whose Line is It Anyway", and the American version with Drew Carey, I eagerly anticipated the release of Murderville. Since watching it, I have recommended this show to my friends and am hopeful that Netflix will produce more episodes. And, while it was fun watching how mega-actress Sharon Stone handled the unpredictability of the show, some episodes fell flatter than others because not all celebrities are well-suited for improv. The Batman is dark, and I do mean dark. From the first strains of the opening song by Nirvana to the new storyline, to the costuming, to the cinematography but that's okay because Batman is supposed to be dark and brooding. The darker tone strikes a hard chord and follows it unrelenting throughout the film.

There are a couple of twists and changes here with the narrative but anyone who has followed the cannon of the Batman's mythology knows that is nothing the Bat can't handle. These changes, some subtle and some less so, work to flush out the story beautifully. Bruce Wayne as an orphan is highlighted here in a way it seldom has before. The trauma of

his parents' death is more prominently displayed than any other incarnation. It feels true to the story and what he would eventually become. The philanthropic playboy by day and winged vigilante by night felt stale the last go around and this take with its intimate understanding of trauma is better suited for our hero.

The fight scenes are choregraphed in brilliant and brutal fashion and play out against the desperation of the city of Gotham. Robert Pattinson steps into the costume and wears it well. He acts by reacting and this too, works. His chemistry with Zoe Kravitz, as Cat Woman, is palpable but it is his chemistry with Andy Serkis as Alfred that pulls on heartstrings.

Colin Farrell all but disappears into the guise of the Penguin as the Penguin disappears into the seedy underground of yet to surge forward villains. Jeffrey Wright as James Gordon works as the moral compass of the piece and his struggle with clawing his way free of corruption all around him is nothing short of a morality tale.

As to our villain, the Riddler, Paul Dano, steps into the spotlight as a necessary and welcome change from a constant rehashing of the Joker. He is the unsung antagonist of the piece, charting out serial killings like he is leaving breadcrumbs without ever completely tipping his hand. It makes for a compelling mystery and since the director Matt

Reeves has peopled the landscape with would be villains, you spend the entire time searching the screen for him without ever finding him.

This is a beautifully filmed, cohesive re-telling of a mythic hero and I would say one of the best Superhero movies of recent telling. And I say about time. DC surges forward on this one and shows itself as a worthy contender to the Marvel Superhero universe. This is a movie that I will re-watch, purchase for my collection and probably buy a few action figures from. Highly recommend for any serious Batman fan.

In early March, before the buds begin to emerge on the bare branches of trees, crocuses, daffodils, hyacinths and tulips bloom. Yellow, pink, blue, and white flowers bring hope that winter is nearly over, and spring is on the horizon.

The following plants will grow for more than one year, although some, like daffodils, will come back stronger and in greater numbers, while others, like tulips, may fade, growing smaller each year until they don't grow back at all. With all of these, you can cut the flowers but you should not remove the leaves until they completely wither as the nutrients need to return to the bulb so the plant can grow again in the spring.

Crocuses are the earliest to bloom and

can be blue, pink, orange and more colors. They look great in the front of a bed or in your lawn. When they develop into clumps, you can dig them up, divide them, and replant or share them with your neighbors.

Daffodils typically are yellow or white but can also be pink or orange, can have one or two colors, and come in a wide variety of sizes. Different types bloom at various times throughout the summer so you can have blooms for months. They multiply quickly over the years and should be divided when the clumps get thick.

Hyacinths come in a wide variety of colors, including blue, which contrasts the yellow of daffodils beautifully in the

garden. They have a strong, sweet fragrance, so they are lovely to have potted indoors or planted near an entrance.

Tulips come in nearly every color you could imagine and there are numerous varieties. Some can grow to 4 foot tall! They make a colorful impact in the garden but tend to fade over the years, so they need to be replaced.

Spring bulbs are typically shipped to arrive for planting in the fall, but you can put the plants in your garden now for your enjoyment today and for years to come. I like to get the plants when they are discounted after Easter, put them in the garden, and forget all about them until I am pleasantly surprised in the spring!

From the Parkside Kitchen of Matt Saunders: Rajas Quesadilas

This one is dedicated to all the vegetarians and their parents who had to scramble to learn how to cook without delicious meat.

Ingredients:

- Poblano Peppers
- Red/Yellow Bell Peppers
- · Red Onions
- Roma Tomatoes
- Cilantro
- Lime
- Sour Cream
- Taco Seasoning
- Tortillas
- Cheddar Cheese
- Pepper Jack Cheese
- Guacamole
- · Crème Fraiche
- Salt/White Pepper
- Black Beans

Directions:

Clean all produce (make sure it is dry) then mince and dice (remember to core and de-seed all peppers) all of it and set aside in separate bowls (Mise en Place – French for having all your ingredients prepped and ready before cooking and it works, folks).

Combine minced onion, half the tomatoes, cilantro, juice from ½ lime and season with white pepper and a dash (only a dash) of salt in a small bowl. Set Aside.

Combine ½ sour cream, ½ tsp Taco Seasoning, **Frank's Red Hot** to taste and tsp Crème Fraiche. Stir until mixed then add drizzles of water until you can drizzle mixture. Water is your friend here, keep a little bowl next to you. Set Aside.

Heat olive oil in large frying pan, then add peppers (all 3), sliced onion and salt. Cook until tender and there is give to the onions. Stir in rest of tomatoes and more Taco Seasoning, 2 tbsp of water. Cook until tomatoes are soft. We want this mixture wet and saucy, so don't be afraid to add as you go. Take off heat and add black beans (1/4 can), cilantro, a couple of tbsp of sour cream, season as you like. Set aside.

Working with 2 large tortillas, sprinkle ½ of each with Cheddar cheese, top with vegetable filling from frying pan, then sprinkle with Pepper Jack cheese. Fold in half.

Heat olive oil in frying pan, add Quesadillas and cook until cheese is melted, and tortillas are golden brown (about 3 minutes each side).

Cut into wedges, top with Salsa, Guacamole and drizzle cream mixture and Serve with a garnish of black beans and blue corn chips.
